## City Manager

Eden Freeman, Winchester City Manager, received the Credentialed Manager designation from the International City/County Management Association (ICMA) in January 2016. 

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## **Development Services**

The City's Development Services division is charged with facilitating the growth of Winchester's economy by facilitating business and workforce development, neighborhood stabilization and general real estate redevelopment within city limits.



The division, along with the **Winchester Economic Development Authority**, utilizes creative tools such as historic tax credits, the Winchester Enterprise Zone program, loans to leverage real estate and business development, and general business advice to assist with economic development efforts. Programs and actions have been responsible for various historic property restoration and business growth throughout Winchester.

#### **Winchester Towers**

In October 2014, the City of Winchester purchased the Winchester Towers property with the intention of securing a partner to assist in the development of the property into a useful and attractive contributor to downtown Winchester. In 2016, the City sold the property to the Economic Development Authority (EDA) for \$795,000. Since the Winchester Towers redevelopment project is located in the enterprise zone, the City made available up to \$400,000 in previously earmarked Enterprise Zone funding for the demolition and building stabilization of the Winchester Towers. After evaluation of the structure and proposals that explored the merits of demolishing or restoring the structure, the EDA opted to pursue the comprehensive demolition of the structure, which was completed in December. The EDA determined that the proposal presented by Glaize Developments, Inc. had the greatest potential to affect positive change in the area. Discussions with Glaize about the development of the property are ongoing, but the EDA is hopeful that the site will eventually be developed into a boutique hotel and conference center.

#### **Taylor Hotel**

The EDA sold their interest in the Taylor Hotel building in Fall 2016 to facilitate the establishment of a Macado's restaurant on the ground floor and basement commercial space inside the structure. To accomplish this transaction, City Council authorized the modification of Taylor Pavilion, LLC's existing Business Development Grant for Vacant Properties incentive so that the Macado's restaurant would receive four years of incentive payments (all net new business taxes generated by the business) that would begin eight months after the issuance of a building permit for the restaurant renovation for the Taylor Hotel property.

## **Tourism**

The Winchester-Frederick County Convention and Visitors Bureau was founded in 2001 by the City of Winchester and Frederick County for the purpose of promoting tourism-related programs, attractions, businesses, and points of interest for the benefit of the city and county.



Each household in Winchester & Frederick County paid \$444 less in state and local taxes because of tourist spending.



## Old Town Winchester

Old Town Winchester is the department responsible for promoting Winchester's downtown area.

The WPA budgets \$60,000 each year for on-going capital maintenance repair items for the garages.






#### **New Interactive Map**

#### The Lofts at Jubal Square

**Before:** Former vacant industrial and commercial property along the south side of Jubal Early Drive was called out in the Comprehensive Plan for redevelopment.

After: Approved through Planned Unit Development zoning, Jubal Square Apartments represents a New Urbanism residential project. It includes construction of a large segment of the Green Circle Trail along the south side of West Jubal Early Drive and The Lofts at Jubal Early Square (140-unit apartment complex with community center).

## Zoning and Inspections

Quality of life in residential neighborhoods is a recurring topic among the citizens of the city of Winchester.


The Department of Zoning and Inspections utilizes a wide array of applicable codes and ordinances, including the Code of Virginia, the Virginia Uniform Statewide Building Code, the Winchester Zoning Ordinance, and the Winchester City Code provisions

to enforce health and safety standards. Through the administration of these adopted codes, the City can better achieve its goals of environmental, social, and economic sustainability.

The Department of Zoning and Inspections provides three major services to the city:

## **Police**

The Winchester Police Department (WPD) is one of only 30 Virginia accredited law enforcement agencies (Virginia Law Enforcement Professional Standards Commission) out of approximately 340 agencies. WPD has 101 employees, 76 of which are sworn law enforcement officers.


Awarded a competitive grant from the Bureau of Justice Assistance to purchase body-worn cameras (BWC) for the Winchester Police Department, Winchester Sheriff's Office and Frederick County Sheriff's Office. Total for all participating agencies:

- Number of BWCs 195
- 50% match responsibility \$104,828 (shared by all three participating agencies)
- Federal grant award amount \$104,828

With the support from the City, Frederick County, Clarke County and Valley Health, established a regional drug court through the Northern Shenandoah Valley Substance Abuse Coalition.

- The City acted as the fiscal agent and applicant on behalf of the recipient, the Northern Shenandoah Valley Substance Abuse Coalition, for a United States Department of Justice, Bureau of Justice Assistance Grant. The Adult Drug Court Discretionary Grant, in the amount of \$350,000 over the next three years, allows the court to expand its capacity to serve additional individuals who have a substance use disorder.
- began operation on August 16, 2016 and became the 26th operational Adult Drug Treatment Court in the Commonwealth. Drug treatment courts serve as treatment-based alternatives to jail. These courts make extensive use of comprehensive supervision, drug testing, treatment services, immediate sanctions, and incentives.

The City's Emergency Communications (9-1-1 Dispatch) Center achieved accreditation from the Communications Committee of the Virginia Office of Emergency Medical Services.



Launched a Teen Night program at the Youth Development Center (YDC) in January 2016 as a way to engage with youth and improve relationships with minorities in the community. Each week, an average of 30 teens attend the event. Activities include basketball, volleyball, movies, pool and ping pong.

 Received a \$20,000 grant from Virginia's "Policing in the 21st Century" initiative for this program.

Launched the first Teen Citizen's Academy and had 14 youth participate. The Academy provides students, ages 14-17, with an inside look at local law enforcement operations and challenges and allows them to explore a possible career in law enforcement.





#### **In Memory of Master Patrol Officer Brunson**

The Winchester Police Department lost a veteran Police Officer on September 11, 2016. Master Police Officer Mike Brunson was killed when he crashed his pick-up truck while driving on Highway 50, near his home in Capon Bridge, West Virginia. Brunson, 48, was a 21-year veteran of the Department.

## Fire and Rescue

The Winchester Fire and Rescue Department (WFRD) is a combination system of volunteer and career firefighters, EMS personnel, and hazardous material responders. The city's volunteer fire companies own all four stations and the apparatus.

#### Good News

Completed the third John Handley High School EMT program in partnership with the Lord Fairfax EMS Council as part of Winchester Public School's Career and Technical Education (CTE) program. Eight students participated, several are now volunteers at City fire stations and one former student is now a Winchester Fire and Rescue firefighter.

Received a cost-sharing grant from the Virginia Department of Fire Programs in the amount of \$470,000 to build a new live fire training building. City Council approved an additional \$270,000 as the cost-share portion.

2016 Stuff-A-Truck program yielded 1,600 pounds of food for the Highland Food Pantry, winter gear for Winchester Public Schools, toys and gifts for C-CAP, and the Salvation Army prior to the holidays and funds for the Winchester Police Department's Teen Night at the YDC.







## Mission Lifeline Silver Award

Received the American Heart Association's Mission Lifeline Silver Award for exceptional care of victims experiencing myocardial infarctions (heart attacks).

## Emergency Management

Emergency Management works to ensure the City is prepared to address, respond, and recover from major emergencies and disaster situations that may impact the city.



#### Completed the 800Mhz public safety radio communications project:

- Brought online in September after more than a decade of planning, budgeting and installation
- Provides both internal and external interoperability between agencies/departments and establishes dependable radio communications for emergency and non-emergency operations
- Personnel now have the ability to communicate from within major structures to the dispatch center and field units where such communication was not possible with the old system

## Completed a full-scale Active Shooter Exercise at Daniel Morgan Middle School in September:

- Involved the following agencies: Winchester Public Schools,
   Winchester Police Department, Winchester Sheriff's Office, Frederick
   County Sheriff's Office, Virginia State Police, Winchester Fire and
   Rescue, Frederick County Fire and Rescue, Winchester Parks and
   Recreation, City Manager's Office, and more
- Designed to train response personnel, evaluate response strengths and weaknesses, and to create a planning tool to continue improving





#### **Conducted Mass Care Exercise in March:**

- Involved the following agencies: Winchester Social Services, Red Cross, Salvation Army, Winchester Parks and Recreation (shelter facility), Winchester Police, Fire and Rescue and the City's Community Response Team
- Designed to test the City's operational capabilities of opening a shelter during a disaster and providing needs such as bedding within a dormitory, food and medical assistance in a secure environment for an extended period of time to victims

## Public Services

Public Services is the largest overall division in the City and consists of eight different departments: Utilities, Utility Billing, Engineering, Public Works, Traffic, Facilities Maintenance, Transit, and Equipment Maintenance.

#### Pedestrian Safety/Transportation

#### **Meadow Branch Avenue Extension**

In 2014, City Council approved several improvements to Meadow Branch Avenue. The project consisted of building a new extension to connect Merrimans Lane to Buckner Drive and providing access to the new John Kerr Elementary School. The extension, which had been planned since 1958, was opened on June 3, 2016.

#### **Traffic Signal Removals**

A traffic signal warrant analysis showed that the existing traffic signals at five intersections were not necessary. Therefore, the signals were removed and stop signs were installed at the following intersections to ensure adequate safety due to sight distance limitations:

- S. Loudoun Street at Whitlock Boulevard (stop signs on Whitlock)
- S. Loudoun Street at Southwerk Street (all-way stop)
- Weems Lane at Wilson Boulevard (stop sign at Wilson)
- N. Loudoun Street at Wyck Street (all-way stop)
- W. Boscawen Street at Washington Street (all-way stop)

#### **Green Circle Trail: Town Run Phase II**

- Completed and opened to the public in September
- Lighting and emergency call boxes were installed

#### **Handley Boulevard Improvements**

The City's portion of the project between Braddock and Stewart Streets included the following improvements:

- Sidewalk replacement
- Curb and gutter replacement
- Street repaying
- Intersection of Handley and S. Stewart converted to an all-way stop

#### **Indian Alley Improvements**

In an effort to improve pedestrian safety on W. Cork Street near Indian Alley, the City:

- Permanently closed the parking lot entrance from Cork Street
- Added bus parking on Cork Street
- · Added a crosswalk on W. Cork Street
- Reversed the loading zone and travel lane on Indian Alley

#### **Flashing Signals**

To improve pedestrian safety in these high traffic areas downtown:

- Added a flashing stop sign at the intersection of N. Braddock and Amherst
- Added flashing pedestrian crossing signs at the intersections of W. Cork Street and Indian Alley and N. Cameron Street and Rouss Avenue

#### Winter Storm Jonas

City declared a State of Emergency on January 22 in preparation for the storm.











#### **Stormwater**

#### **Valley Avenue Drainage Improvements**

This improvement project corrected the long-standing flooding problems on Valley Avenue between W. Southwerk Street and Lambden Avenue. The flooding occurred frequently after a large rain event because there was no existing underground storm water drainage system in this area.

#### **Facilities**

#### **Joint Judicial Center Renovation**

This renovation was required to accommodate the additional judges appointed by the Commonwealth and the corresponding new courtrooms needed.

#### City Hall and War Memorial Building Brick Façade Improvements

Rouss City Hall was built in 1901 and over time, the mortar between the bricks had worn thin. In an effort to improve the safety of the structure and to reduce moisture leaking inside, the City repointed the bricks for the entire building. The same was done at the War Memorial Building.
